Dear Mr. Humphrey:

The Mattachine Society of Washington is a civil liberties, social action organization, devoted to improving the status of the horosexual American ultizen. A copy of our formal statement of purpose is enclosed.

A recent newspaper article stated that you have pladged an all-out campaign to wipe our discrimination wherever it exists in government. As shown by the enclosed statement on "Discrimination against the Employment of Homosemuals", one of the major ereas of discrimination in the Federal government is that against rembers of the homosemual minority — the nation's largest remotity group after the Negro.

We have written, in vein, to many Federal officials, asking, as citizens, to meet with them, to discuss our problems and to seek redress for our greivances. We have been refused. In many instances, we have not even received the cost on courtesy of a reply.

We realize that this is a difficult and awkened problem. Nevertheless, it can be ignored no more than can the problem of discrimination against the Negre. No To us, equal employment opportunity means equal opportunity for ALL, including the homosexual citizen. One's private, out-of-working hours sexual activities are no more the proper concern of an employer, public or private, than are one's religion or aking color.

Hembers of our own community are becoming increasingly insistent upon the achievment of our rights, to the point that in April, and again within the past few days, sizable groups of howcockuals and those supporting their goals, picketed before the White House, in protest against discriminatory Government policies against homosexuals; a larger group picketed the United Nations in New York City, for the same reasons. There will be other such demonstrations.

This is an important problem, involving 15,000,000 American citizens. We earnestly request that you give it your careful consideration.

We will be pleased to discuss these matters with you personally, at your convenience.

We look forward to your early reply.
